Dear Parents,

Big and small keys, deadlocks, bolts, chains, padlocks and even nails are all used to lock doors. When we come across a locked door, it can stop us in our



tracks, thwart our plans, or say to us, "You aren't welcome here," and there's nothing we can do about it. It takes an intervention of some kind to open a locked door.

Even the disciples of Jesus gathered behind locked doors because they were afraid. In Luke's Gospel we read of the man who refused to open his door to a friend "the door is already locked, and my children and I are in bed; I cannot get up and give you anything."

At the beginning of the Jubilee Year of Mercy, Pope Francis opened the Door of Mercy. The doors are normally sealed by mortar and cement so that they cannot be opened. He declared that the time for tenderness, joy and forgiveness had begun.

Some doors are locked to keep others out – those who disturb us, the stranger whose presence challenges us, those who ask something of us, those we know but do not want to make welcome. Is my door of mercy, the door of my heart, carefully locked in these situations? Perhaps we lock the door of mercy because we are afraid or wounded – we feel unable to reach out to others at this time. Our doors of mercy are closed and locked tightly when we think we know it all or when we shut out an alternate viewpoint.

May our God of Mercy break through our locked doors, offering us the gifts of joy, tenderness and forgiveness

Sibling Enrolments for Kindergarten 2017

Parents are reminded to submit enrolment forms for siblings who will be seeking enrolment in Kindergarten 2017. Offers of enrolment will be made at the point of interview not at the conclusion of the entire enrolment process. Therefore, in order to secure a position it is important that parents submit sibling enrolment forms and arrange for an interview to be conducted as early as possible so as not to miss out on a position in 2017.

Why are we asking your children to attend the Mid Year School Report Interviews?

In Week 9 when the teachers meet with you about your child's learning, we are asking you to bring your child to the meeting. This is an opportunity for teachers, children and parents to



acknowledge the progress and achievement that has been made in the first semester of the school year. The children will talk about their learning achievements as well as their learning goals. Parents will have the opportunity to ask questions both of the teacher and of their child. The interviews will vary slightly across the grades depending on the age of the children.
