Dear Parents,

Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed, for the LORD your God is with you wherever you go. **Joshua 1:9**

Welcome

I would like to welcome and introduce Mr Stephen Bamford who will join the St Bernadette's staff from next Monday. For the remainder of this term Mr Bamford will be teaching across the school and in 2018 he will be a class teacher at St Bernadette's.

Class Groups in 2018

In 2018 there will continue to be 3 classes in Kindergarten, Year 2/3/4/5 & 6. Given the enrolments in the 2017 Kindergarten, for 2018 there will be two Year One class groups.

Over the next few weeks the teachers spend a significant amount of time ensuring that all students have a positive transition from one year to the next. This includes teachers meeting with each other to learn about all the students that they will be teaching the following year. This is a very thorough and thoughtful process.

This year the children currently in Years One, Three and Five will progress to their next year level group in the same class group. Children in Kinder, Two and Four will have their class groups rearranged into newly formed classes giving children an opportunity to learn with other children. Teachers take many factors into consideration when re-grouping children including social and learning needs.

HELP WITH MATHS

Enthusiasm for and interest in maths and numeracy for children relies on making it appealing, relevant and challenging for them. There are many ways in our everyday lives where we can 'play' with maths and help our children. Start early, 'play' often.

When we walk down the street, or stroll at a park or along the beach, point out the different objects around them – houses, cars, trees, signs, shells, swings and so on.

Talk about the shapes, sizes and angles around them, look for similarities and differences between them – the number of circles or cars, size order of angles, most





popular colour, patterns in registration plates,

number of wheels, etc.? Can you find some parallel lines? Curved versus

straight lines? How many angles are there in the beach chair?

Talk about the weather - the temperature, have there been hotter days or cooler days before this day, wind speed and direction, or the speed and direction of your walking pace.



Estimate how far it is to places along your path.

Collect leaves or shells and make repeating patterns on the sand.

Play games - I spy with my little eye, something that's shorter than you, or something that is taller than the trees or something west of where you're standing.

Above all, when you talk with your child about the world around them - be descriptive, point out some of the many things that we as grown-ups take for granted and use appropriate mathematical terminology. Build on what they notice about shapes, numbers and measures. When children listen to you describe the maths in the world around them and see what you point out, they come to appreciate how much mathematics there is in the world and the need for them to be mathematical thinkers.

Are you going 'Trick or Treating' for Halloween on Tuesday 31st October, 2017?

NSW Police recommend you do not participate in this activity. However, if you choose to participate, here are some things you should consider:

- Is it safe to take sweets or lollies from strangers?
- Do I know the person whose door I am knocking on?
- Will I get into trouble from police if I play a 'prank' or damage property?
- What if a stranger talks to me?



Remember your safety tips from the NSW Police 'Keeping Me Safe' initiative:

- Safety in numbers! Walk in a group. Never walk alone. Ensure you have adult supervision.
- Hold hands and cross roads at safe locations such as marked crossings and/or traffic light intersections. Don't forget to 'Stop, Look, Listen and Think.'
- Do not take candy, lollies, chocolate from strangers.
- Do not talk to strangers other than the people nominated as 'Safe people' from 'Safe places'
- If you feel unsafe or unsure remember to tell a stranger 'No' 'Stop' and/or 'Go away'

If you would still like to celebrate the occasion, perhaps you could consider celebrating at home.

Police will not tolerate poor behaviour, particularly in public so remember your manners just like every other day of the year.
