Dear Parents.

I am sure that you have heard the belief that, "A positive attitude attracts positive energy", just as I am sure that like many, you believe that in most circumstances there are two ways to look at life, positively or negatively.

Our attitude towards life determines life's attitude towards us. A positive attitude is the outward expression of a mind that dwells on positive matters; "As a person thinks in his heart, so he is". Proverbs 23:7. If we have a mind that conjures up images of difficulties and failures, we need to do something about it. We need to elevate our thought processes and install mental pictures of success and achievement. In this way we can look down on our problems instead of looking up to them.

St Paul encouraged the people of Ephesus to "Put off the old self to be made new in the attitude of your mind". Eph 4:22. By changing the inner attitude of our mind, we can change the outer expression of our life.

Attitude is contagious. Positive attitude gives energy to you and to those around you. So what type of attitude training do we give our children? Do we offer them encouraging thoughts? Do we lead them to read and view positive material that will inspire? Do we encourage them to be outward in their thinking? – there's much more to think about in life than themselves. Do we provide for them the "triple goodies" of good nutrition, good sleep, good exercise? Do we encourage them to focus on the "good things" they have in life and to be content?

Samuel Johnston reminds us that, "Our attitude is the expression of our values, our beliefs and our expectations." How is our attitude perceived by our children? It is important for our children to realise that no matter how hard they try to develop positive attitudes, they don't live in a vacuum. They will surely come across people who have an unenlightened view on life. However, it doesn't matter what kind of attitude other people present to them, what matters is how they deal with it and how they perceive its worth.

Hopefully, they will have us to look up to for their models for positive living.

Peer Support – Stronger Together

Students at St Bernadette's have the right to be a part of a safe, secure and welcoming community where everyone is treated with dignity and respect. In Week 6, our Peer Support lesson will focus on students working together to reflect on how we can ensure everyone feels safe, secure and a part of our wonderful school community. In our groups, students will discuss their rights with respect to belonging to a community free from exclusion, teasing, harassment or bullying. Although we believe that bullying can occur in any environment, and while we do not consider that bullying is widespread at St Bernadette's, we feel it essential that we have established procedures to not only combat bullying if it arises, but to cultivate a supportive environment where bullying cannot become established. Across the school, Peer Support Leaders, Teachers and students will develop strategies and techniques students can employ to combat the effects of negative behaviours and of students feeling unsafe. Over the weekend we are encouraging parents to discuss with their children strategies they could use to ensure everyone at St Bernadette's feels safe, secure and happy.

After lunch, we found ourselves immersed in the world of politics. At Parliament House we learnt how our laws are made and passed through the House of Representatives and the Senate. We were even

lucky enough to sit in on question time in the House of Representatives, where we viewed our Prime Minister Mr Malcolm Turnbull and the Opposition Leader, Mr Bill Shorten discuss critical issues impacting Australian people. Not only did we get to see first-hand how our political system operates, we created our own House of Representatives and role played how to pass a bill. Acting as part of the House of Representatives was not only an educational experience but extremely fun, especially when we acted as ministers persuading others to vote in favour of our ideas. If seeing our future politicians in action wasn't exciting enough, we also enjoyed the experience of meeting with our very own Federal Minister for Mitchell, Alex Hawke. We hope Mr Hawke will be able to come and visit us again soon when we are back at school.

The accommodation at the Ibis Styles Eaglehawk Resort was quite sufficient. However, we didn't have a lot of time to rest as our learning journey for day one was not over yet. Off to the Australian Institute of Sport we went.

After an early morning breakfast, we were back on the coaches once again making our way to The Electoral Education Centre, where we learned about and took part in the process of our preferential voting system. At the beginning of the tour, we watched a multimodal clip outlining how Australia's democratic society was formed. It was affirming to see the connections between this video and our learning in class.

As many of us play and follow sport, we were thrilled to see just where professional athletes train for national and worldwide competitions. We know that it will only be a matter of time before a number of our students are back at the AIS, only this time they will be the ones that school tours admire and aspire to be. Year 6 were then enrolled in our very first and exciting election, where we voted for our electorates; apple, orange, banana and peach. Who would you vote for?



Our last stop on our adventure was Questacon. What a way to end our tour exploring all the scientific elements across a range of fun activities such as how lightning is created, the impact of natural



disasters, exploring flight and other ways we use science each and every day. The highlight of our visit had to be experiencing gravity through the freefall adrenaline ride. That feeling of weightlessness as you fall towards the ground and the relief when your body finally connects with the slide is an experience not to be missed.

Finally, we arrived back at St Bernadette's safe and sound ready to share all of our learning with our families. Thank you to all of the teachers who accompanied us on this jam packed amazing excursion. Although it was a very busy schedule, all of the teachers made the two days as much fun as it was educational. A truly wonderful experience that will remain a memory we will remember forever as part of our time at St Bernadette's.

AUSTRALIAN GOVERNMENT ASSISTANCE FOR NATIONAL CAPITAL EXCURSION

The Australian Government recognises the importance of all young Australians being able to visit their National Capital as part of their civics and citizenship education. To assist you (the parent) in meeting the cost of the excursion the Australian Government is contributing funding of \$20 per eligible student under the Parliament and Civics Education Rebate (PACER) program toward the travel expenses incurred. This contribution will be paid directly to the school upon completion of the excursion. This amount has already been factored into the overall cost of Year 6 excursions for this year. We would like to thank the Australian Government for their support of this program.
